The work we do each day provides justice to thousands of our neighbors in Westchester County who have nowhere else to turn, including protecting individuals from domestic violence; defending seniors against abuse; serving veterans on the homefront; supporting the rights of the disabled; ensuring that LGBTQ individuals are free from discrimination; and keeping families in their homes.

COVID-19 has highlighted the disparity between people throughout the State. The inequities faced by poverty influence a wide range of health and quality of life outcomes and increases the need for our services throughout the county.

Westchester County

LSHV opened its doors in 1967 with one office in White Plains, NY. Currently, we have four offices across the county and have expanded into six other counties as well.

Westchester County is the 10th most expensive metropolitan area in America* but has 90,000 low-income people living in densely populated urban communities. There are pockets of poverty throughout the county with the areas of greatest need being Yonkers and Mount Vernon, followed by New Rochelle, Peekskill, Port Chester and White Plains. These low-income residents desperately need civil legal services in all practice areas. There are gaps in service in every substantive area of poverty law, with the most urgent needs felt in areas affecting the essentials of life: a roof over one's head, subsistence income, safety from violence, and access to health care and education.


